meet the Risen Lord, and prepare themselves, in a way that is concrete and therapeutic, for Holy Communion and of course, ultimately, the Second Coming. Vespers is also a great time, unlike prior to Liturgy, to make a confession. There's no clock to worry about, and you have the evening in which to prepare for Communion.

All this is well and good, but, somehow external for most of our congregation. We have a conflict in our current way of life, because for very many families, Saturday evening is "protected time" for various activities. After a long work week, a person genuinely has to recharge, and if not that, do housework, chores and errands during the time off from work. This is a fact of life, which results in only about one quarter of our parish membership ever experiencing Vespers, and thus never being properly ushered into the Lord's Day or truly catechized, I dare say. Usually and very unfortunately, this means that there are only two or three children, maximum, at the Service. Why do I mention children in this context? If our children do not know Vespers, we are ensuring that the next generation of adults will not attend Vespers either, and perhaps, having one less Orthodox "thing" to hang on to, eventually absent themselves from Liturgy as well. If Saturday evening is "protected time" for families, in the Church it is also "sacred protected time," and more so than a national park or monument. For those that are not used to coming to Services on Saturday evening, I encourage you to make a plan: start with attending once a month and increase that over the next few months. You will be glad you did. —Fr. Lawrence

• ONE ASPECT OF VESPERS:

We all know that Sunday is the Lord's Day, and that in the Divine Liturgy we participate, here and now, as we are spiritually able, in what the liturgical theologians call "the Eighth Day," meaning, that Blessed Day beyond the seventh day, the Sabbath, beyond the days of this world. It's the Day without evening, in which the Lord Himself is the sun and light and is "all in all." It's the "day of Resurrection" in which we gloriously reign with Him in His Kingdom. All that and more is given to us at the Liturgy.

How does one "jump" from the world of daily cares and responsibilities into such a magnificent reality? It's not possible, usually, to make such a jump, and furthermore, there's no need for it. Orthodoxy likes transition in these cases, and one can say that the Saturday evening Service transitions us into the celebration of the Lord's Day. Vespers, and of course Matins when it is joined to it (we call that "Vigil"), spiritually takes us through God's plan of salvation—by means of hymns, psalms, the Gospel, dark and light. We hear about the creation, the Fall from Paradise, the prophecies and the preparation for the coming of the Messiah, His Incarnation, signs, teachings, warnings, His Passion, death, resurrection and the glorious "robe of majesty," the Ascension, the gift of Pentecost, the gift of Holy Baptism, and even the Second Coming, which we await, yet even now taste beforehand in the Church. All this is part of Saturday evening Vespers, and even more so when Matins is joined to it.

Since the day that the Apostles gathered in the Upper Room, on the First Day of the week, Resurrection Day, the Church has joyfully and solemnly kept Vigil before the Divine Liturgy, and has *protected and guarded* this time, as it were outside of time, as one of the ways in which Her members
