## • BAPTISM & CULTURAL WARFARE:

Everyone is sick of the "culture wars," right? And if they are over, shouldn't honesty require that Christians, of all people, just admit defeat and get on with being the church the best we can? I think it's a bit more complicated than that, and ultimately I don't think any "strategic withdrawal" or attack, for that matter, is really "the answer." I say this in part because I consider "culture war" itself a slogan, a media-driven sound-bite that reduces the complexities of human life, sin, and faith to a phrase a reporter can 'Google.' The answer is the same as it has always been, and that is Christians should be engaged in spiritual warfare against the world, the flesh, and the devil 24/7. Our calling as Christians is much more rigorous than any culture war I've seen in my lifetime. Baptism means you wear the uniform of Christ. If defending life and marriage are tiring, what of our daily struggle against sin? Any decision to defend life and marriage should not be that hard to make, since these are primordial goods: God created life and God created marriage [see Genesis]. (He didn't create government bureaucracies.) The Christian's duty to daily repentance and to carry the cross is likely more rigorous than any engagement in a contemporary culture war--unless the culture is violently anti-Christian, in which case carrying the cross may mean martyrdom, as it did for Ignatius of Antioch. The defense of life and marriage in our society is not so heavy a duty to bear (for many, it may involve minimally a mere voting choice). Becoming holy is the harder thing, but Christ's grace is sufficient, if only we would continually seek him and be faithful in small things. If we desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus, we will be persecuted. That's what Paul wrote to Timothy (II Tim. 3:12) So, no matter what, do not be discouraged. We are in Good Company, for all who are persecuted for righteousness sake-theirs is the kingdom of heaven. He has already overcome the world.


#### HOUSE BLESSINGS:

# • PROSPHORA:

Your Commemoration Books await renewal for the new year at the Candle Desk. These books are for the priests to pray before the Divine Liturgy for those whose names you have listed. The *Prayer of Proskomedia* is extremely powerful and beneficial, as affirmed by Church tradition.

Proskomedia is the "service of preparation" of the bread and wine before the Liturgy. The bread that will become the Holy Eucharist is brought to the Altar on a tray, the Diskos. In the center is the bread—the Lamb—which will be changed by the Holy Spirit to the Body of Christ from which we commune. To the right is the particle in honor of the Virgin taken from another loaf; and to the left, particles for the nine ranks of saints from another loaf (Prophets, Apostles, Bishops, Martyrs, Monastics, Unmercenary Healers, St. Seraphim and others and St. John Chrysostom. Below the Lamb are particles of bread for the living and the departed, from two other loaves—included here are the Metropolitan, the Diocesan Bishop, and particles for all those names submitted by you.



The visual aid above—that of the *Diskos* and the particles, is an image of the Church, the Body of Christ: here is Christ and His Holy Mother on His right hand, the Saints, and the faithful, you and me and our spiritual family in Christ. After Holy Communion, all the particles are placed in the Chalice, immersed in the Precious Blood of Christ.

Because this is about Holy Communion and the Body of the Church, your lists of names should be divided between those who are Orthodox (in this life now, or departed this life) and those who are not. This is not to ignore the non-Orthodox, but to make clear that this is about Communion and the Church, which is the visible Body of Christ. The priests absolutely do pray for everyone listed. We should each have a duplicate book of names for our own use, and pray for those names we have listed each Saturday evening or Sunday and before coming to Church for the Divine Liturgy. I and the other priests are praying with you, not instead of you. —Fr Lawrence
