head-scarf, and this is entirely in keeping with Tradition of the Church. St. Paul seems to strongly suggest wearing one (see 1 Cor. 11: 10). However, just to be clear, it is certainly not obligatory here, nor will anyone give those who do not wear the head-covering a pharisaically-critical look down their noses. Let common sense, tastefulness and good manners prevail. —*Fr. Lawrence* 

### • IVERON MYRRH-STREAMING ICON OF HAWAII:

What a great blessing is coming to us. On Bright Saturday, May 11, at the 5 PM Vespers, we will welcome the Holy Myrrh-streaming Icon of the Theotokos, brought to us from Hawaii. There will be an Akathist during the Vespers, and each person will be anointed with the myrrh that miraculously flows from the icon itself.

#### • PUTTING CHRIST FIRST FOR HOLY WEEK:

"Indeed I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as dung, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own, based on law, but that which is through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith; that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that if possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brethren, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but one thing I do, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus." —St. Paul, Philippians 3:8ff. Fr. Stephen Freeman wrote that "St. Paul seems to have lived his life in a perpetual Holy Week—pressing forward—pushing past exhaustion—and reaching for Christ in a Pascha that reaches back and captures the soul for God. Nothing to be earned, but everything to be gained."

After the Liturgy there will be a breakfast reception to honor the newly-illumined, hosted by those who were baptized last year. Everyone is invited. Here are some thoughts on the meaning of that day: Lazarus, a friend of Jesus, was sick; he died. Seeing all the friends of Lazarus grieving and weeping, Jesus also wept and grieved, sharing and bearing their grief, as He does for us each day —as He suffers along with us. Seeing His own beautiful creation in bondage to the law of death, the tomb, to injustice, abuse, sorrow and despair, the One who created all things out of non-

existence weeps. And He raised the stinking corpse of Lazarus (John 11:39). Remember, we are never too far gone, too far out of the reach of God's power, never too sinful, never too dead, never too corrupt for God's power to reach us. With Lazarus we see the sign of God's coming at the end of time, and God's holy plan for salvation and resurrection for the rest of us. Not a resuscitation to the same life—but a resurrection of the body, the *whole person*—to life eternal, and the renewal of His entire creation. — *Fr. Lawrence*
