CARMINA CHROMATICA:

Nicolas Custer's renaissance choral ensemble will present a free concert for the Parish on Sunday, May 15 at 1:30 PM, in St. Seraphim. The group will sing eight motets on lenten themes, six from the Renaissance, one by C. Saint-Saëns, and one piece, which is a premier performance by a member of the group.

PASCHAL ARTOS

At the end if the Paschal Liturgy a beautifully decorated "loaf" of bread, the Artos, is blessed. The Artos symbolizes the physical presence of the resurrected Christ among the disciples. We bless the Artos with a special prayer and sprinkle it with Holy Water. It remains on a table before the Iconostasis throughout Bright Week. It is customary, to kiss the Artos, as a way of greeting the Risen Christ. In monasteries, the Artos is carried to the Trapeza every day of Bright Week, where at the end of the festive meal, it is lifted in a ceremony called the Lifting of the Artos. The one performing the ceremony will lift up the Artos (symbolizing Christ's Resurrection) and say, "Christ is Risen!" All will respond, "He is truly Risen!" The celebrant will then make the sign of the Cross with the Artos as he says, "We worship His Resurrection on the third day!" Then two Paschal hymns are sung and everyone comes forward to kiss the Artos and receive the Superior's blessing, as all sing the Paschal troparion many times. On Bright Saturday (here we do it on Sunday), before the Agape Meal, the Artos is brought to the Parish Hall, a prayer is offered, and it is then broken and distributed among the whole congregation.

• TRADITIONS OF THE PASCHAL SEASON:

The Resurrection of Christ is a powerful spiritual force in our lives, especially during the Forty Days until the Ascension (June 9), when the Church teaches us to pray in certain ways. For example, because Christ is raised, and we are raised with Him, we do not kneel or prostrate in Church until Pentecost. Watch the priests in the Altar at the time of the Consecration of the Holy Gifts, and you will see that they do not prostrate, but only bow. Also noteworthy during the Paschal days is that when we pray we replace "O Heavenly King" with "Christ is risen from the dead, trampling down..." and "It is Truly Meet to Bless Thee" with "The Angelo Cried...."

SERBIAN CATHEDRAL IN NEW YORK:

We mourn for the loss of the historic Serbian Orthodox Cathedral in NYC, which burned down on Pascha. Investigators have tentatively determined that at the end of the Liturgy paschal candles were placed in a cardboard box which caused the cardboard to burn and ignited the rest of the building. Please note: in our church when we collect candles, we pinch the wick (not only to extinguish it but to alleviate some of the smoke, which is bad for the icons) and they are placed in a metal bucket, which will not ignite. Nevertheless, considering all the lamps and candles, much care is needed.
