I apologize for sounding disapproving. In fact, there would be no need for any comment at all on this matter if we would all simply pay attention to the Divine Liturgy and the responsibility of each and ever member of the congregation for participating in it, so that we begin this magnificent Liturgy to and with our Savior—at the beginning—as the Body of Christ, not a random collection of individuals which arrive whenever is most convenient to them. —Fr. Lawrence

#### DORMITION:

Since Dormition is the Feast day of the Monastery in Calistoga, \*Vigil WILL NOT BE SERVED HERE\* on Thursday evening, August 14, as previously indicated in the Calendar. Vigil at the Monastery begins at 5 PM, with a meal following. Dormition is the Monastery feast day, and the Sisters expect us to come; it is only seems right that we join them on this occasion. We apologize if the change in venue causes anyone inconvenience.

# • ANTICIPATING THE GREAT FEAST:

The Feast of the Dormition of Our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary is celebrated on August 15 each year. The Feast commemorates the repose (Dormition) or "falling-asleep" of the Mother of Jesus Christ. The Feast also commemorates the translation or assumption into heaven of the body of the Theotokos...Along with the biblical reference in Acts 1:14 that confirms that the Virgin Mary was with the Holy Apostles on the day of Pentecost, the tradition of the Church holds that she remained in the home of the Apostle John in Jerusalem, continuing a ministry in word and deed. At the time of her death, the disciples of our Lord who were preaching throughout the world returned to Jerusalem to see

the Theotokos. Except for the Apostle Thomas, all of them including the Apostle Paul were gathered together at her bedside. At the moment of her death, Jesus Christ himself descended and carried her soul into heaven. Following her repose, the body of the Theotokos was taken in procession and laid in a tomb near the Garden of Gethsemane. When the Apostle Thomas arrived three days after her repose and desired to see her body, the tomb was found to be empty. The bodily assumption of the Theotokos was confirmed by the message of an angel and by her appearance to the Apostles. The Icon of the Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos shows her on her deathbed surrounded by the Apostles. Christ is standing in the center looking at His mother. He is holding a small child clothed in white representing the soul of the Virgin Mary. With His golden garments, the angels above His head, and the mandorla surrounding Him, Christ is depicted in His divine glory. The posture of the Apostles direct our attention toward the Theotokos. The women are members of the church in Jerusalem. In front of the bed of the Theotokos is a candle that helps to form a central axis in the icon. Above the candle is the body of the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary. This great Feast of the Church and the icon celebrates a fundamental teaching of our faith—the Resurrection of the body. In the case of the Theotokos, this has been accomplished by the divine will of God. Thus, this Feast is a feast of hope, hope in Resurrection and life eternal. —adapted, www.goarch.org
