means, Your treasure will be where your heart is. We think that the thought is what matters. But Christ was quite materialist (wholistic) about the matter. Your treasure (your stuff) controls your thoughts. If you say you care about the poor, give them some of your stuff. If you don't care about them, give them some of your stuff. If you give enough, over time you will come to care. The heart follows. Prayer is very much like this as well. We imagine prayer to be some sort of mental force. Thus, when a matter seems desperate, we call on others to pray with us and for us, imagining that the more minds we can join in prayer, the more powerful the prayer becomes. This is simply secular nonsense. If you want powerful prayer, then do as the Fathers did, fast and give alms. Deny yourself, and give stuff away to the poor. Ask the poor who benefit from your generosity to pray for you. They will with glad hearts. — Father Stephen Freeman

• CONVERSATION WITH A RUSSIAN ELDER:

One afternoon, when we were sitting in his tea-house, I asked Fr. Nikolai about reincarnation. Why was the church so certain about that? Oh, that's simple, he said. All the people I know in heaven have kept their individuality. Then he went on to tell me a story. A certain woman in his church had been having discomforting dreams involving her deceased mother. In the dreams the mother accused her of not writing to her, All my friends here receive letters from their children at home. But you send me none! The dream was recurring. After a fourth dream, and in great distress, the woman came to Fr. Nikolai. He suggested they include her mother in the Panikhidas served after Sunday liturgy. Four weeks later her mother appeared again to her in a dream, beaming and joyfully holding up handwritten letters from her daughter. You wrote... You wrote! Thank you!.
