• SCRIPTURAL ANTHROPOLOGY:

In Genesis 2:7, God creates man from the dust of the earth....While God has called all of his creation thus far 'good', he says that it is not good that Adam is alone. This text represents the beginning of modern misinterpretation. It is not a statement that Adam is lonely. It is not a reference to his emotional or spiritual state in any way. In those senses, Adam is most certainly not alone, in that he lives continually in the presence of God himself, not to mention the angelic hosts who also dwell in the garden. Adam lacked nothing in regards to companionship, conversation, and fulfillment in his relationship to God. What was lacking becomes apparent when reading the preceding text. The plants all reproduced after their kinds. The seas and the skies teemed with life. The land animals reproduced after their kinds. Adam was alone. God is the one who gives life to the world, and in abundance. Adam was alone. God's solution to this problem is that he will make a helper who is suitable for Adam. God states this solution before the naming of the animals, so the latter does not present some sort of trial and error experiment. Rather, as Adam names the animals, he becomes aware of the problem as all of the animals exist in gendered pairs who reproduce, bringing new life into the world. He himself has been directed by God to serve in cultivating the garden, to assist in the bringing forth of life in the world (Gen 2:15), but he himself is not able to do so. The word which is generally here translated as 'suitable' or 'fitting' is the Hebrew 'kenegdo.' This word contains the ideas of both 'parallel' and 'opposite.' This helper will be someone who is like Adam, but who is also differentiated from him in a way that the two will fit together. This includes the anatomical level, but also goes beyond it to the emotional, spiritual, and personal level. The two will fit together, and bring new life into the world. When God then sets out to fashion this helper for Adam, he does not simply create another human out of the earth who happens to be differently gendered. Rather, Adam is put into a deep sleep, like unto death. God then removes his side (not just a "rib").... To state it more simply, God pulls Adam in two. He then 'fills in' the missing portion of Adam and builds out the side of Adam which he has taken into a woman. As Adam states upon awakening and seeing her, henceforth humanity ('adam') will exist as man and woman, in Hebrew 'esh' and 'eshah,' male and female. —Fr. Stephen de Young

• HYMN FOR THE FEAST OF THE CONCEPTION OF ST. JOHN:

VISITING THE SICK AND SHUT-INS:

The recently reposed Fr. Steven Belonick (+Aug 7, 2019), who spent the last two years of his life very ill, once reflected on his visits with countless people with illnesses of all kinds—some curable, others life-threatening—as well as his experience being one of the sick himself when he was laid up for weeks in a hospital bed: "...visits from fellow human beings are healing; just the presence of another human being is healing. Most noteworthy of all, I eventually learned that the 'visitor' and 'visited' become 'Christ' to each other. Jesus' words (paraphrased), '...when you have done so to the least of the brethren, you have done so to Me,' now take on new meaning: for, when we are in the role of the 'visitor,' we are in the guise of Christ coming to the needy; likewise, when we ourselves are the "visited," we are equally in the guise of Christ, in the image of His humanity."
