responsible for teaching and assisting in your preparation, and ultimately, answerable to God as I offer the Chalice to you. Without a doubt, I am confident that all of you are profoundly grateful to God, that in His great mercy He has given us these Holy Mysteries for the healing and salvation of our souls, and for union with Him, Who is the "head of the body, the church..." (Col. 1:18) and for union with each other. —Fr. Lawrence

• INVITING FRIENDS TO CHURCH:

Did you know that 82% of the unchurched say that they would come if invited? Did you know that only 2% of church members invite someone to church in a given year? If your parish is dying (and many Orthodox parishes in the US, especially in the Northeast, are indeed dying), don't you think it's time you invited someone to church? If your parish is healthy, don't you think it's time it gave birth to another healthy one? Do you really believe that you've found the true faith, seen the true light and received the heavenly Spirit, like you sing near the end of the Liturgy? Then why are you keeping it to yourself? Think of at least one person you know who isn't in church. Make him or her a spiritual priority this year. Pray every day for that person. And when the time is right, give the invitation. Statistically speaking, they are probably going to say yes. And when you make the invitation, don't say, "You should come to church with me sometime." "Sometime" is no time. Say, "We're celebrating the Divine Liturgy this Sunday at 10 AM at my church." Can I pick you up and bring you with me?" — Fr. Andrew Stephen Damick, St. Paul Orthodox Church, Emmaus, PA

• TITHING:

There are...cases in which an individual truly has nothing left after necessities provided for himself and for those dependent upon him. He should then offer, like the trusting Widow of the gospel, his token "mite" and trust that by God's grace he will "reap abundantly." Besides, it is for the sake of such as these that the rest of us are commanded to be diligent in our giving—that from the abundance given us, others may not do without. Indeed, even the rare person who can make only a "token" offering, if he has first given himself to the Lord, will find ways to contribute to the work of the Lord in ways which are sometimes far more constructive than money itself. He can labor in God's Temple, work for the relief and comfort of the sick and lonely, and finally, when there is nothing left to give, offer his own prayers and sufferings as prayers and petitions of incense before the face of God for the sins of all mankind. —borrowed

• MISSION OPPORTUNITY:

On **Saturday December 19**, after Vespers (about 6 PM or so), we will welcome Mr. Taylor Hostetter from Atlanta, who will speak on two subjects: first, "Living and Sharing the Fulness of the Gospel as Orthodox." The second talk will introduce us to a mission trip to Serbia, called "Cooperative Training Mission to Serbia with The Navigators" (blessed by the Serbian Orthodox Church and our Diocese of the West). The first talk will focus on evangelism and mission, in general; the second talk on the Serbia trip. Mr. Hostetter is coming not to raise funds for this mission trip but rather to share with us thoughts about Orthodox evangelism, and to find interested people to join the trip. • PREPARING FOR NATIVITY ~ CONFESSION:

In preparation for receiving Holy Communion on the Feast of Nativity (December 24 and 25) please make your confession in the weeks or days prior. Confessions are heard on the weekend, as usual, weekdays by appointment, and in the days before Nativity, per the Calendar. In general, *those who commune each week should be making a confession at least once a month.* As your priest I don't regulate the frequency of your confession and communion, or check whether you're prepared for Holy Communion. It's on the "honor system" and must be that way. There's freedom in Christ, and I respect the freedom of each person. However, I am
