
PREPARING TO SAY YOUR PRAYERS:

The first preparation consists in rejecting resentment and condemnation of our neighbors. This preparation is commanded by our Lord Himself: When you stand praying, He orders, forgive, if you have anything against anyone, so that your Father, Who is in heaven may forgive you your offenses. But if you do not forgive, neither will your Father Who is in heaven forgive you your offenses. Further preparation consists in the rejection of cares by the power of faith in God and by the power of obedience and surrender to the will of God; also a realization of one's sinfulness and the resultant contrition and humility of spirit. The one sacrifice which God accepts from fallen human nature is contrition of spirit. If Thou hadst desired sacrifice, I would have given it, says His Prophet to God on behalf of everyone who has fallen and remains in his fallen state. It is not merely some partial sacrifice of body or soul, but even total holocausts do not please Thee. The sacrifice for God is a contrite spirit; a contrite and humble heart God will not despise. St. Isaac the Syrian repeats the following saying of another holy father: "If anyone does not recognize himself as a sinner, his prayer is not acceptable to God." —St. Ignatius Brianchaninov, The Arena

• NOMADIC SHELTER—FIRST NIGHT:

We thank the Redwood Gospel Mission for bringing the Nomadic Shelter ministry to our parish. The first "Shelter Night" went incredibly well, thanks to Ambrose Inlow's organizational work. Gabe Griovski made a wonderful dinner, which was so appreciated by our thirty or so guests. Alexandra Clark, one of our high school students, played the piano beautifully. Father Lawrence gave a short meditation on the Christmas story, and why the Lord was born in lowly Bethlehem, homeless, rather than in powerful Rome. Our volunteers—about a dozen of you—conversed with the guests and made them feel welcome and valued. One volunteer wrote the following: "Thank you so much for partnering with Redwood Gospel Mission to provide a night for people in need. I had the honor to speak with five or six people and get to know them a bit. I have worked with the homeless, but in a much less intimate setting and often second hand supervising the people who worked directly with the clients. I usually knew the children more than the parents, even though I met the parents and knew that they were living in a car, garage, shelter, or even under a bush, I never had the kind of experience I had last night. The gratitude of the participants was overwhelming. The talk

on the Nativity was beautiful. The music helped people forget, for a couple of hours, their circumstance. In many ways I think the parishioners there benefited more than the participants—I know I did. Thanks again for a beautiful and unforgettable evening." —a volunteer

• CONFESSIONS DURING THE LITURGY?

It's been the practice here for many years, and will continue, for confessions to be heard before the Divine Liturgy (9–10 AM). Eventually, confessions were being heard during the Liturgy, up to the Beatitudes. This is not entirely proper, as Confession, being a Holy Mystery in and of itself, shouldn't be "tucked into" the Divine Liturgy (there are exceptions now and then). Many of you have expressed the feeling that the faithful—which includes the clergy—should be able to participate in the Liturgy from the beginning. So, once the bells ring, we will aim to begin the service together. Confessions are also heard Tuesday—Saturday by appointment, and during and after Vespers on Saturday evening.
