preparation for receiving the Incarnation with joy and understanding are drawing to a close. We may come to church on the feast, but if we have not prepared our hearts, we will miss the fullness of the spiritual experience. Everything of value in life is worthy of preparation, and there is no greater event than the birth of the Son. Attend services, pray, read, be charitable, love your neighbor, and give gifts of love and devotion. —In joyful anticipation, *Father Thaddeus Hardennbrook*

SAINT HERMAN OF ALASKA:

On December 13 the Church celebrates the memory of our Venerable Father Herman of Alaska, who lived from 1756–1836. As a monk of Valaam, in northern Russia, he learned the hesychastic tradition of the Jesus Prayer from Elder Nazarius. Along with ten other monks, he arrived in Alaska in 1794 as part of the Russian Mission. Despite the harsh conditions, and the rampant abuse of the locals by the immoral Russian hunters and merchants against the natives and the monks, St. Herman and the others managed to baptize over 7,000 people in the Kodiak region, and set about building a church and monastery. In 1807 St Herman, the last of the ten original missionaries, moved to a hermitage on Spruce Island—continuing to care for his beloved flock. Many miracles were worked by St. Herman, to the glory of God and for the good of his people.

• PREPARING FOR NATIVITY ~ CONFESSION:

In preparation for receiving Holy Communion on the Feast of Nativity (December 24 and 25) please make your confession in the weeks or days prior. Confessions are heard on the weekend, as usual, weekdays by appointment, and on the three days before Nativity (before and after Vespers on December 21–23). In general, *those who commune each week should be making a confession at least once a month*. As your priest I don't regulate the frequency of your confession and communion, or check whether you're prepared for Holy Communion. It's on the "honor system" and must be that way. There's freedom in Christ, and I respect the freedom of each person. However, I am responsible for teaching and assisting in your preparation, and ultimately, answerable to God as I offer the Chalice to you. Without a doubt, I am confident that all of you are profoundly grateful to God, that in His great mercy He has given us these Holy Mysteries for the healing and salvation of our souls, and for union with Him, Who is the "head of the body, the church..." (Col. 1:18) and for union with each other.
