been prepared by our Lord Jesus Christ to receive this divine indwelling. But the outpouring of the Holy Spirit does not stop there, for the crowned man (Cosmos) at the bottom and in the center of the Apostles represents all the kingdoms and nations of the earth. Having received the Holy Spirit, the Apostles began to speak and preach the Gospel in a multitude of tongues which were the languages of the nations of the earth. Shortly after this the Apostles divided up the whole of the known world between themselves and began to preach the Gospel to all nations. The scrolls represent the various nations, each of which would be taken up by one or the other of the Apostles. There he would go to proclaim the Resurrection and the defeat of sin, death and the devil and the freedom of all men from their captivity." (Father David Moser).

• "NON-GLENDI PARISH WORK PARTY—From Fr. Lawrence:

With no Glendi next weekend, most of you will be seriously looking for things to do around the church...There is no irony in that statement, as I know how hard all of you work, how many hours are put in before, during and after the Glendi. We can get "our fix" by offering a few hours of our time on Saturday, September 17, starting at 9 AM. What's on the to-do list? With the Parish Feast day of the Protection of the Virgin quickly approaching (October 1) we need to start by cleaning up the property. *Garden work:* trimming trees (including the olive trees) and garden in front of St. Seraphim; cleaning weeds and debris from around the churches; weedwhacking behind St. Seraphim. Trash: remove garbage from around compost pile into dumpster, remove the old hall appliances and other garbage which are piled behind the red shed. **Small gardening projects:** move parking blocks to proper spaces; install new irrigation lines at southwest corner of Protection Church. PENTECOST FRESCO:

Several people have commented on the beautiful fresco of Pentecost, painted on the northeast side of the Church. We all know that the Apostles are gathered there together, as it explains in Acts 2. We see St. Paul is depicted in the fresco, yet we know that he was not actually there, being a persecutor, not a believer, at the time. He's there because the icon represents the fulness of the Apostolic preaching. Also in the icon is a seemingly mysterious figure, with the name "the Cosmos."
