BRIGHT SADNESS

IN THE SECOND BOOK of Chronicles we read how Hezekiah, King of Israel, following a time of sacrilege, ordered the date of the celebration of Pascha for that year to be changed! The Chronicler tells us:

"Hezekiah sent to all Israel and Judah, and also wrote letters to Ephraim and Manasseh, that they should come to the house of the Lord at Jerusalem, to keep the Passover to the Lord God of Israel. For the king and his leaders and all the assembly in Jerusalem had agreed to keep the Passover in the second month. For they could not keep it at the regular time, because a sufficient number of priests had not consecrated themselves, nor had the people gathered together at Jerusalem. And the matter pleased the king and all the assembly. So they resolved to make a proclamation throughout all Israel, from Beersheba to Dan, that they should come to keep the Passover to the Lord God of Israel at Jerusalem, since they had not done *it* for a long *time* in the *prescribed* manner" (2 Chron 30. 1-5).

King Hezekiah made this decision based on a provision in the Law of Moses, as recorded in the Book of Numbers, stipulating that the Passover may be kept in extraordinary circumstances on the fourteenth day of the second month instead of the first month. No one has any intention of tampering with the date of the celebration of Pascha, but we make this observation so that you know that even the Law of Moses makes provision for cases in which the celebration of Pascha is interrupted.

Brothers and sisters, for many of us this is a time of extraordinary, perhaps unprecedented, difficulty socially, economically, physically, and spiritually. Our



liturgical life has been temporarily upended, not only in terms of the Lenten and Paschal services, but also with respect to the "special" services—baptisms, chrismations, weddings, etc., which are now postponed to around the time of Pentecost. This is a grief to us all. Yet the demands of the Gospel upon us have not changed. Christ calls us to watch and pray, anticipating his coming again, and, most especially, to love one another.

While we must keep at a physical distance for the time being, we must not give in to despair and abandon the struggle for the salvation of our soul. This does not mean we should not experience disappointment or sorrow at the prospect of having an experience of Holy Week and Pascha that is typically reserved for prisoners and shut ins. But we ought not to allow sadness or irritation to overwhelm us and darken the light that God has planted in us, and renewed time and again through the holy mysteries. We are not abandoned, either by God or the Church. We suffer together in common trouble and we labor in prayer together in common hope, trusting the promise of Christ that if we are faithful to the end we will be saved (Mt. 24:13). —Archimandrite Gerasim, Administrator of the Diocese of the South Dean of St Seraphim Cathedral

How Can I Best Protect My Flock?

If we keep our faith pure, if we try to live by faith, God will send us peace and tranquility. However if we sink into the abyss of human passions, enmity, and confrontation, then, of course, we will stray from the Lord's way, and it will not do any good. —from the current Metropolitan Onuphrius of Kiev

Last Sunday I served the Divine Liturgy alone. I was blessed by Archbishop Benjamin to have only one singer present (my son Justin), and no Altar Server. As I was preparing for the Liturgy, and commemorating each of you at the Proskomedia, setting a particle for each on the Holy Diskos, I thought: it's a pandemic, and perhaps it's better to have no Liturgy at all, since if the parish members cannot be together in the church, and of course receive Communion, than neither shall I. Solidarity! When the Holy Liturgy concluded, I turned off the video camera (we streamed the service) and saw that over fifty comments appeared on the <u>Facebook page</u> telling me that my thinking couldn't have been more wrong. Our people told me how important it is that the Liturgy is served and (live-streamed), that it gave them spiritual nourishment, and brought their attention back to God and His peace and His Gospel, and that it felt as if "they



were there" with me. By the end of Sunday there had been over 1000 views of the Divine Liturgy, and more comments. I was encouraged and inspired by you. So we shall continue as follows:

The Divine Liturgy will be served per the monthly calendar—with the doors locked and with only one singer present. The Church will remained closed during this pandemic. This course of action has been blessed by Archbishop Benjamin, and indeed, directed to be so in his pastoral letter today, dated April 2, 2020. Sadly, this means that I cannot give you Holy Communion (we had hoped that some way of

distributing Communion would be possible after Liturgies, but this is not blessed); there will be no baptisms on Lazarus Saturday (God-willing we will move them to Pentecost); we will not decorate the Church with Palms, nor bless them at a Vigil. Holy Week will be abbreviated so that I can chant some hymns and the Scripture readings in a live-stream; there will be no joyful exuberance at a Holy Saturday Liturgy (Arise, O God and judge the earth...), and Pascha itself will be most unusual, without the throngs of faithful responding Indeed He is Risen. But, the Lord is risen! Please remember, that the Holy Week prayer services and Pascha itself will be live-streamed on Facebook. I urge you all to make yourself familiar with the technology NOW (check the calendar for times) in order to not be "shut out of the technical bridal chamber" later, when/if you log on at the 11th hour. For now, pray more frequently, more fervently and more broadly (use the Akathists, the Supplicatory Canons and the morning and evening prayers). The Lord will send consolation to help us be together in the Spirit, if not side-by-side. —Fr Lawrence

KNOWN BY GOD

Don't seek fame...seek God. St. Zosima sees St. Mary a total of three times, and the third time, he sees her just in order to bury her. And it's only then that he realizes that he never asked her her name (so maybe he's not so astute after all!). But the words are scratched into the earth next to her, "Abba Zosima, bury on this spot the body of humble Mary." Up until that moment, no one would have known who she was. Apart from Zosima's three visitations, she would have died in total obscurity, and all of her story and her 47 years of desert exile would—it seems—have been for nothing. ...And now—15 centuries or so later—the story is still known by Christians around the world and recalled by Orthodox on the fifth Sunday of Lent every year. Could anyone have ever expected to gain such recognition? ...Unfortunately, we sometimes think that we can accomplish lasting recognition by showing off some talent, making a splash with our fellow man. But how long does that last? What's it really worth? More importantly, where would we be now if there weren't men and women like St. Zosima and St. Mary who had rejected all the world's possibilities and given their whole heart to God? —Grace Brooks
