The Meeting Of The Lord In The Temple

The Feast of the Meeting of the Lord, one of the Great Feasts of the year, is celebrated on February 2. Matins will begin at 8:30 AM, followed by the Divine Liturgy and the blessing of candles. Below is a short meditation on the feast to help us prepare for it.

A Sermon by St. Sophronius of Jerusalem

Our lighted candles are a sign of the divine splendor of the One who comes to expel the dark shadows of evil and to make the whole universe radiant with the brilliance of His eternal light. Our candles also show how bright our souls should be when we go to meet Christ. The Mother of God, the most pure Virgin, carried the true light in her arms and brought Him to those who lay in darkness. We too should carry a light for all to see and reflect the radiance of the true light as we hasten to meet him.

The Light has come and has shone upon a world enveloped in shadows; the Dayspring from on high has visited us and given light to those who lived in darkness. This, then, is our feast, and we join in procession with lighted candles to reveal the Light that has shone upon us and the glory that is yet to come to us through Him. So let us hasten all together to meet our God.

The True Light has come, the Light that "enlightens every man who is born into this world." Let all of us, my brethren, be enlightened and made radiant by this Light. Let all of us share in Its splendor, and be so filled with It that no one remains in the darkness. Let us be shining ourselves, as we go together to meet and to receive with the aged Symeon the Light whose brilliance is eternal.

Rejoicing with Symeon, let us sing a hymn of thanksgiving to God, the Father of the Light, who sent the True Light to dispel the darkness and to give us all a share in His splendor. Through Symeon's eyes we too have seen the salvation of God which He prepared for all the nations and revealed as the glory of the new Israel, which is ourselves. As Symeon was released from the bonds of this life when he had seen Christ, so we too were at once freed from our old state of sinfulness.

By faith we too embraced Christ, the salvation of God the Father, as He came to us from Bethlehem. Gentiles before, we have now become the people of God. Our eyes have seen God incarnate, and because we have seen Him present among us and have mentally received Him into our arms, we are called the new Israel. Never shall we forget this presence; every year we keep a feast in His honor.

nary graduate who is zealous with the love of God and the desire to serve and evangelize. The parish cares for the intern, his wife and children, extending itself in love and charity. Over the years, we have had the following interns, some for a matter of weeks, some months, and in the case of the Cuneo family, over a year: the former Fr. John Ramos, Fr. Derek Leonid Schmidt, now rector of St. Gregory Palamas in NJ; Fr. John Diamantis, now rector of St Vladimir Church in Trenton, NJ; Fr. Paul (Brian) Fetsko, now rector of Sts George and Alexandra in Arkansas, and Fr. Andrew Cuneo, priest of St. Katherine's in Carlsbad. In working with each of these men and their wives, I deepened my own priestly understanding and work, and this enabled me to be more active in evangelism, which in turn brought real growth to the parish in membership and in quality.

We have been challenged by our Archbishop and St Vladimir's Orthodox Theological seminary to host a very capable and pious man and his family, to accept them as interns here, providing them the kind of education that seminary cannot provide, but that is essential for the formation of a good priest. Having met the intern candidate and his family—Father Theodor Svane, his wife Hanna and children (one four year old, and one due in May)—I accept the challenge of Vladyka Benjamin and the seminary, and ask you to do the same. In response to this challenge, in November our Parish Council offered a unanimous resolution to financially support the Internship program.

Before coming to the U.S., Fr. Theodor (a convert to the Orthodox Church) was a civil/construction engineer, and his wife Hanna an associate professor at a community college. They come to us very

highly recommended by the Seminary staff, by clergy that know them and our Archbishop. Fr. Theodor and his wife have asked to come to work with and for us for a year, beginning in June or July. The Svanes are from Norway, so in due time they will be returning there.

In practical terms, what does that resolution mean? The Council designated a line item in the 2015 Budget for financial support: \$12,000 was pledged, with another \$8,000 coming from the weekly offerings. One parishioner has offered to move out of his condo, and rent it to the Svanes for a reduced amount. Our remaining task is to raise another \$20,000, so that a reasonable compensation can be provided to the intern and family.

I ask that you join me and the Parish Council in supporting the internship of the Svane family and humbly request that for the next year you consider adding to your weekly or monthly tithe a designated amount—whatever you can manage—for this purpose. No appeal letters will be sent nor will there be a hard sell to come up with the funds. Our parish relies at all times on both God's blessing and on your good will and support. I trust that if the Lord blesses, He will multiply and increase our efforts. Your comments and ideas on this endeavor are invited. Please share them with me or our Treasurer, David Winterton. —Fr. THE JOURNEY TO LENT BEGINS

THE PASCHAL SEASON of the Church is preceded by the season of Great Lent, which is also preceded by its own liturgical preparation. This weekend at Great Vespers we will hear the hymns about repentance, humility, pride, prayer and hypocrisy—based on the **Parable of the Tax Collector and the Pharisee** (Luke 18), read at the Liturgy the following day. We begin to sing that most compunctionate of hymns: *Open to me, the doors of repentance, O Giver of Life, for my spirit rises early to pray toward Thy holy temple, bearing the temple of my body all defiled, but in Thy compassion, cleanse it by Thy loving-kindness and Thy mercy...*

On February 8 we read the **Parable of the Prodigal Son** (Luke 15), which reveals not only man's wasteful prodigality, his self-induced misery and his afflicting misery on others, his exile from God, true repentance, the journey toward God, and again hypocrisy, as seen in the older brother, but more importantly, the love of God for us. On the same day we sing Psalm 136, *By the waters of Babylon, there we sat down and wept*, and meditate on our exile from the Paradise of true life, true union with God.

On Sunday, February 15 we hear the **Parable of the Last Judgement** (Matt. 25), about the Sheep and the Goats, about who sees, and who doesn't see, the image of God in others and what they do about it. On this Sunday we eat meat for the last time until Pascha, so the day is called "Meatfare."

The following week, Sunday, February 22, is **Forgiveness Sunday**, so-called because of the reading from Matthew 6:14 about forgiving our enemies, proper prayer, fasting, and works of mercy, leads us to the doors of Great Lent. More properly the title of the day is the Commemoration of the Expulsion of Adam and Eve from Paradise, and the hymns of the day will meditate on this sorrowful reality, which came about from the misuse of freedom and lack of trust in God, prompted by the evil one. We also call this day "Cheesefare Sunday" because we eat the last of our dairy, eggs and cheese. At 1:15 PM or so, after the Agape Meal, we will enter into Great Lent with the Vespers of Forgiveness: the gold icon cloths are replaced with the darker, royal purple; the chanting is done in the "lenten mode" and we participate in the act of mutual forgiveness at the conclusion of the Service. As we quietly and in an orderly fashion line up, we come to the clergy and then one another and say: "Forgive me" answering "God forgives," and we bow down in humility. Once we

learn to forgive others—even unto "seventy times seven"—then we can be free at last to experience God's forgiveness, which is the third step in the process. God's forgiveness is love in its purest form. It heals our hearts, makes us kinder to our fellows, and leads us into union with God. Forgiveness is a form of love—and love is the highest law. As St. Paul wrote to the Romans: "Do not be obliged to anyone for anything, except to love each other; he who loves has fulfilled all the rest of the law." By the way, if you are able to do a prostration before each person, fine; if not, a bow is more than sufficient. Do not let anything keep you from attending.

I encourage each and every single parishioner to participate in these Services—especially in the *Vespers of Forgiveness*, on Sunday, February 22, at 1:15 PM. It seems to me that no Orthodox Christian could enter into Great Lent, or celebrate Holy Week and Pascha without the experience of Forgiveness Sunday. The Church gives us such a service precisely because it is the perfect antidote to our self-enclosed, self-centered, excuse-making, other-blaming and critical existence. I wonder why and how anyone could intentionally miss this Service, and would perhaps even ask that person about it.


