THE GREEK philosopher Heraclitus is quoted by Plato as saying, "You cannot step twice into the same river." This is because, for Heraclitus, the world is in a constant state of change and flux. The water of the river is replaced by other water, and so no river is truly the same, and therefore cannot be entered twice. This view is very much in line with our modern sentiment: the naming of the river is an arbitrary, accidental quality of the water that flows in it. The water is a term that grossly simplifies the molecular, impermanent compound made from hydrogen and oxygen, but for the Orthodox Christian, there is nothing arbitrary about water. It was created by God and blessed in the very beginning by the movement of the Spirit over it. It was created as a foundation of all of life plants and animals. It is the cleansing of a world by flood of the world that forgot God. It is the reminder in the wilderness of God's sustaining faithfulness to Israel. It is the water of the Jordan that maps out the entrance of the Promised Land, and it is the water of the Jordan in which each of us is baptized into and with Christ.

We are accustomed to thinking that language marks out reality, that man is the measure of all things, and so shapes the world by his perceptions. But, it is the other way around: God's creation pushes in on us, draws us out of our heads and away from ideas so that we can, as the Psalmist writes, "...taste and see that the Lord is good." It is the water on our faces and lips, the bread that we eat, the wine that we drink, the light by which our homes and porches are lit. All of these are part of the bodily, incarnate expression of God's love. All of these things find their true meaning and existence in Christ. We drink and we wash because Christ is the water of life. The feast of Theophany joyously celebrates that we do not worship a God of ideas. We are not a "religious people," but, rather, we live in a world enlightened by the life of the Son of God. All water is set aright with Christ's baptism, and we can and do enter into the Jordan, through baptism and through the blessing of the water. With Christ, we enter into the same river twice, and again. —Garret Paul Hamner



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PROSPHORA OFFERINGS

SINCE THE BEGINNING of the Church, before each Liturgy the faithful would bring gifts of money, food, bread and wine to be used by the Church and for distribution to the poor. Even so today, a portion of the offered bread and wine is be used for the Eucharist, and prayers are offered on behalf of those who give these offerings and for those who have reposed in the Lord. As an expansion of this offering, before the Liturgy, small "prosphora" bread loaves are brought into the Altar with a list of names of those living and departed. The priests pray for each person by name, taking out a small particle of the bread from each loaf and placing it on the plate (diskos) holding the Eucharistic bread. Pastoral advice: please list the names of those who are in your "spiritual family" so to say, rather than every person you know. After Holy Communion those particles, which represent each person, are placed into the Chalice and mingled with the Body and Blood. In doing this, we refer all things to God, the Creator and Fashioner, and give thanks to Him for

EVENTS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

- NEW YEAR'S DAY SERVICES: At Vespers we sing hymns for the saint or feast celebrated on the following day (Vespers begins the new day, liturgically speaking). On New Year's Eve we will have Vespers at 5 PM for the Feast of the Circumcision of Christ and St. Basil the Great, Jan. 1. Of course, we will include prayers asking God's help, guidance and forgiveness as we begin the new civil year. On January 1 we will have the Divine Liturgy at 9:30 AM, in honor of this Feast of the Lord and St. Basil, and once again pray that the Lord sends us blessings for the new year. Start the New Year right by praying at these Divine Services.
- SUNDAY, JANUARY 6th is the Great Feast of Theophany (Epiphany) which commemorates the Baptism of Christ in the Jordan, and the revelation of the Holy Trinity. The prayers for the Great Blessing of Water will begin immediately after the Liturgy that day—so bring a container with you to take Holy Water home.
- HOUSE BLESSINGS: The Candle Desk has the "Master List of House Blessings." Blessings begin on afternoon of January 6. Dates, times and names are listed when a priest will come to bless your home. If the time and day scheduled for your home is not convenient, simply cross your name off the list and other arrangements can be made. There are a number of parish homes that have never been blessed, oddly enough, and I hope to change that this year with your cooperation. We Christians are engaged in a struggle to reclaim fallen nature for the Kingdom of God, so the Church humbly reaches out to reclaim a bit here and a bit there for the glory of God, casting out demonic influence, and bringing the blessing of the Jordan River to each homes. What more important place to bless and to offer to the Kingdom of God?
- ANGELS UNAWARES: On the first Thursday of the month our parish welcomes guests from the Redwood Gospel Mission, hosting about twenty or so needy folks for dinner and providing a place to sleep for the night.
