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THOUGHTS ON SANCTITY

THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS follows the week after Pentecost, as a kind of confirmation and celebration that the power of the Holy Spirit, imparted in the Holy Mysteries of Baptism and Chrismation, is effective, real and powerful. Pentecost bestows the gift of the Spirit, in fulfillment of the Lord's promise that He would send the Comforter, and He would abide with us forever. The Spirit of Truth unites us to the Risen and Ascended Lord, and so the Paschal victory over sin and death is made possible in us. Of course, we must respond, accept and live the Paschal mystery of the Cross and Resurrection in our daily lives. Those who do respond are the saints—and certainly there are far more saints known only to God, and perhaps to their families or monasteries, than whose names appear in our service books. When Christians depart this life, they remain a vital part of the Church, the body of Christ. They are alive in the Lord and "registered in heaven" (Hebrews 12:23). They worship God (Revelation 4:10) and inhabit His heavenly dwelling places (John 14:2). In the Eucharist we come "to the city of the living God" and join in communion with the saints in our worship of God (Hebrews 12:22). They are that "great cloud of witnesses" which surrounds us, and we seek to imitate them in running "the race set before us" (Hebrews 12:1). Rejecting or ignoring the communion of saints is a denial of the fact that those who have died in Christ are still part of his holy Church. The True Church is

composed of all who are in Christ—in heaven and on earth. It is not limited in membership to those presently alive. Those in heaven with Christ are alive, in



communion with God, worshipping God, doing their part in the Body of Christ. They actively pray to God for all those in the Church—and indeed, for the whole world (Ephesians 6:8; Revelation 8:3). So we pray to the saints who have departed this life, seeking their prayers, even as we ask friends on earth to pray for us. The saints provide us with living testimonies of a redeemed humanity. They show that Christian perfection—not a perfection moral, ethical, physical, emotional or psychological, but one Christian, coming from Jesus Christ—is not an absurd or inaccessible goal. They are the ones whom God has touched and made whole. They shine with the uncreated light of the Godhead, irradiating their humanity with the new life of the Kingdom against which even death itself has no power. They are mirrors, as we behold them, of what we could be. They inspire us towards this goal, theosis, the promise of a new humanity, a New Creation, transcending even the biological necessities towards something sublime and true, the Love of God made visible, the birth pangs of a new age in which God shall be all and in all when He comes to raise all from the dead. —adapted

ALL ORTHODOX parents want their children to grow up attending Sunday Liturgies and staying active in the life of the Church throughout their lives. Yet many parents don't demonstrate the importance of having a personal relationship with God in front of their children. If you do not make God important, neither will your child. Children observe their parents. They see hypocrisy and know when you are not following through with the teachings of the Church during the week. They hear when you take the Lord's name in vain. They notice when you reserve prayer to weekend service. They notice you only speaking of God on a Sunday morning. Making the sign of the cross, lighting candles and burning incense

only on Sundays teaches your children to compartmentalize their own faith, and leaves them defenseless in a world fulled with temptations and distractions from things that are of a spiritual nature. If you do not demonstrate the importance of prayer before your children, you will leave them defenseless in a world that hates Christ. Your children need to pray with you, read the scriptures with you, be taught the faith by you. If you do not make your home a domestic church, your children will be lost to Christ, and Orthodoxy will not be lived out beyond your own grave. If they do not see you living a committed life in Christ, they will turn from the faith, and Orthodoxy will not survive into the next generation. — Abbot Tryphon

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JULY ORDINATION

THE SUMMER FEAST of St. Seraphim of Sarov is July 19. We begin the festivities with Vigil on Wednesday, July 18 at 6:15 PM. The following morning at 9:30 AM we will greet our Diocesan Hierarch, Archbishop Benjamin, and begin the Divine Liturgy.

Eighth, as much as possible, think small. You are not in charge of the world. Love what is local, at hand, personal, intimate, unique, and natural. It's a preference that matters.

Ninth, learn another language. Very few things are better at teaching you about who you are not.

Tenth, be thankful for everything, remembering that the world we live in and everything in it belongs to God.

UNDERSTANDING EPHESIANS 5

WHEN WE SPEAK of the wife obeying the husband, we normally think of obedience in military or political terms: the husband giving orders, and the wife obeying them. But while this type of obedience may be appropriate in the army, it is ridiculous in the intimate relationship of marriage. The obedient wife does not wait for orders. Rather, she tries to discern her husband's needs and feelings, and responds in love. When she sees her husband is weary, she encourages him to rest; when she sees him agitated, she soothes him; when he is ill, she nurses and comforts him; when he is happy and elated, she shares his joy. Yet such obedience should not be confined to the wife; the husband should be obedient in the same way. When she is weary, he should relieve her of her work; when she is sad, he should cherish her, holding her gently in his arms; when she is filled with good cheer, he should also share her good cheer. Thus a good marriage is not a matter of one partner obeying the other, but of both partners obeying each other."
