• OUR INFIRMITY AND GOD'S PROVIDENCE:

A terrible accident [or a pandemic?] has a power to awaken us to the realization of the existence of various calamities and dangers surrounding us, from which the Providence of God preserves us. At the same time it convincingly persuades us to acknowledge our own infirmity and weakness and to seek the Father's protection and His most powerful defense, which affirms us in the Wisdom and the Word of God, which came down from above by the will of the Heavenly Father under a curtain of flesh like ours, woven by the Divine Might from the Immaculate Virgin, for our salvation. He became man and taught us to pray that we be not led into temptation. This reminds us from what Father we have our existence, and this in turn should make us seek our heavenly Fatherland and our eternal inheritance. —St. Herman of Alaska

• AUGUST 15:

The Feast Day of the Dormition, August 15, directs our attention to final things: our death, the Lord's promise to raise us from death to life-eternal, and of course, the great example of the fulfillment of that promise in the death and translation of the Holy Virgin Mary. The feast celebrates her death and her being raised to the *life of the age to come*—which is why we call it a translation. This feast is a Pascha of the Theotokos, her "translation" from her death to the resurrection, from earth to heaven. The Vigil will be on Friday, August 14 at 5 PM. The Divine Liturgy will be served at 10 AM on Saturday after the baptisms.

• BAPTISMS, AUGUST 15:

It is an appropriate time, at the end of the two-week Dormition Fast, and just before the celebration of the Divine Liturgy for the Feast day, to receive by Holy Baptism three of our catechumens. At 9 AM on August 15, Daniel Durrant, Sonya Elm and Randy Joseph Pelfrey will receive the holy illumination of Baptism. Please keep them in your prayers:

• YOUR HELP IS NEEDED:

Dear Parish family: So that we can maintain our proper Liturgical order and decorum during the on-going restrictions due to the virus, I am going to ask two things of you:

- I. By next week we will have an online sign-up in place, but until then, please let me know if you are coming to a non-Sunday Vespers/Vigil or Divine Liturgy (for example, Dormition). I need this info in order to prepare Communion, and secondly, so that we can keep to our indoor attendance quota (for the moment) of 25. Yesterday's Liturgy for Transfiguration, while festive and wonderful, saw attendance well over the 25 that our sign indicates for indoor attendance (A priest complaining about high attendance? Obviously, things are not right). We are apparently unable to self-regulate, or perhaps the congregation was fine with the attendance (we do have fifty 6' markers on the floor for when we are able to gather in higher numbers). Nevertheless, at the moment, we need to maintain a low key and follow our own current guidelines (they will change eventually). A Parish Council member will monitor the indoor attendance. Those outside will be invited in to receive Holy Communion.
- II. While a service is being live streamed, please do NOT venerate the icons. Veneration should take place before or after a service, certainly not during a live stream when it's very distracting, and our home viewers can comment on "so and so" being in church, which is awkward.

I ask your good will and help in all of this, and your forgiveness for offending. —Fr. L
