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SOME TEMPORARY ADJUSTMENTS

Worship

S WE ENTER November, our county has not reached the COVID markers for opening up venues, including Churches for worship. Our front porch Liturgies will continue for the time being—of course, if it rains (will it ever?) we will serve the Liturgy inside. "By the book" there is no indoor attendance, although we have been allowing 15 max for Vespers and weekday Liturgies, and will do the same for a rainy Sunday morning. When the county does move to the next level of easing restrictions (which apparently won't happen for a while), we will have room for 55 people inside the church, with social distancing. At that point we will probably operate on a *first-come-first-serve* attendance policy, but this will be confirmed after discussion with the Parish Council.

Pastoral Ministry

More impactful for the parish in general will be the temporary changes in priestly ministry. As all of you know, attendance at the Sunday Divine Liturgy is drastically lower than it was last year at this time—for obvious reasons. We now average 75–100 for the Sunday Liturgy, while last year we averaged 180-200. Because of this drop in attendance, and the *much lighter concurrent pastoral duties* here at the parish, Fr. Nicholas will take this opportunity to serve Sunday Divine Liturgies more frequently at our two local Women's Monasteries, starting January 1 (He has already begun to help out and will be in Calistoga for the next two Sundays). The more immediate change: Fr. John and Matushka Xenia, who have been

serving here with great distinction and honor since 2005, will temporarily help out at our sister parish, Sts. Peter and Paul Russian



Orthodox Church on Stony Point Rd. Have no fear, they are not leaving the OCA or our parish, this is only a temporary change due to circumstances, and has been blessed by Archbishop Benjamin. Fr. John will continue to visit some of our parish shut-ins whom he dearly loves, as well as be available for those who regularly make Confession with him—simply call or email him to arrange that and meet him at Sts. Peter and Paul. He will also join us for most of the Sunday Agape Meals, so we are not losing his active participation in parish life.

I see these unfortunate, yet necessary, adjustments as lasting only until we are able to return to a normal indoor Liturgy with a full congregation. Please be mindful that in general (well, there are always exceptions, since we have the blessing of Fr James being with us) there will be very little time to confess on Sunday mornings since I will be the only serving priest. I would ask you to schedule your confessions for any other day or time.

Sunday Agape

The newly-revived and revised Sunday Agape was a wonderful gift to the Parish from the Box Lunch Committee! Thank you, dear friends in Christ, for making this possible. We are now able to restore a little bit more fellowship after the Divine Liturgy, and are grateful for this opportunity. —Fr. Lawrence

Thoughts of Fr. Alexander Schmemann

an has loved the world, but as an end in itself and not as transparent to God. He has done it so consistently that it has become something that is "in the air." It seems natural for man to experience the world as opaque, and not shot through with the presence of God. It seems natural not to live a life of thanksgiving for God's gift of a world. It seems natural not to be eucharistic. The world is a fallen world because it has fallen away from the awareness that God is all in all. The accumulation of this disregard for God is the original sin that blights the world. And even the religion of this fallen world cannot heal or redeem it, for it has accepted the reduction of God to an area called "sacred" ("spiritual," "supernatural")—as opposed to the world as "profane." It has accepted the all-embracing secularism which attempts to steal the world away from God.

The Eucharist is the state of perfect man. When man stands before the throne of God, when he has fulfilled all that God has given him to fulfill, when all sins are forgiven, all joy restored, then there is nothing else for him to do, but to give thanks. When a man stands before

God, face to face, when he has been accepted into his presence, when his sins are forgiven, and he has recovered his pristine beauty, the Eucharist, thanksgiving, adoration, worship, is truly the ultimate and the total expression of his whole being. It is the divine element, the image of God in us, the life of paradise, the one essential relationship with God, the only full and real response of man to God's creation, redemption, and gift of heaven. It is a new style of life, the only real life, of creation with God, and in God, the only true relationship between God and the world. In sin, man has lost that pure Eucharist. He has directed his life, his love, his care, toward other objects. He has become incapable of Eucharist, thanksgiving, which is the state of man in Paradise. **

NOVEMBER 15—AN IMPORTANT DATE

HE NATIVITY FAST begins, as always, on November 15, and continues until Christmas Day, when we break the Fast. The Nativity Fast gives Orthodox Christians the opportunity to prepare for Christmas on December 25. By abstaining from certain food and drink, particularly from meat, fish, dairy products, olive oil, and wine (how about we also fast from TV and social media), we turn our attention to prayer and almsgiving. **One** of the aims of fasting, besides self-discipline and obedience to the spiritual practice of the Church, is that hunger, when given wings by prayer, makes us conscious of our dependence upon God. While fasting from food, we are also challenged to fast from sin, from gossip, from jealousy, from anger, and from those other things which, while well within our control, we all too often allow to control us. There is a strong connection between works of mercy for those less fortunate (alms) and fasting. We not only sympathize with those who suffer hunger and want, we show compassion (to co-suffer) as well. Our compassion is sustained by the love of God when we approach fasting in a prayerful, humble and spiritually directed way. See this link for a short article on fasting. On the first day of the Christmas Fast, Sunday, November 15, a brief Vespers will be served at 1:15 PM to help us make a good beginning.
