• BLESSING BAGS:

The Thanksgiving Dinner project of two weeks ago provided a full meal, everything needed for a full thanksgiving day table, to 200 families. Thank you to those who participated and contributed. As I mentioned on Sunday, while we may not be able to gather together as a whole parish in worship and in the Agape Meal, the Thanksgiving Dinner project shows how much we CAN do and how much blessing there is in the work, during COVID for the good of our neighbors. So, let's set our aim on another charitable project: we annually assemble and distribute "Blessing Bags" for the homeless. Contained in these kits are combs, wipes, toothbrush and toothpaste, a gift card, a rain poncho, a prayer card, protein bars, water bottle, and other items. We can put together 50, 100 or 200 kits, depending on how many folks get involved and what kind of budget we establish. The kits are distributed by the Redwood Gospel Mission and by parish members who have them ready to give to a person in need that they meet. This project needs a manager this year. RANDOMTHOUGHTS:

Each December 6th we celebrate the life and fatherly care of St Nicholas, not because he was a good, charitable, generous, faithful bishop. He has those qualities, only because he had the fruit of the Spirit, which is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. (Galatians 5:22ff). The Epistle of the day lays that out for us. The famous generosity of Saint Nicholas, and his deep love for his flock, was fueled by his love for Christ. He emptied himself for his flock, and was again filled and nourished at the Divine Liturgy. Saint Nicholas reminds us to live a new way: to "attain to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ... [and] to grow up in every way into him who is the head..." (Ephesians 4: 13-15). His life reminds us that we don't need to be a bishop or have an official position in the Church hierarchy. Of course the church is hierarchical, surely it must be; yet it is also *just as much* charismatic—i.e. those whose lives are animated by the Holy Spirit of God are leaders too. We don't need a red Santa outfit, we don't need a bag of toys. What we need is a giving and loving heart, a soul that is always seeking God's will, a love of our Holy Orthodox Faith, to be willing to "step up" to serve the Church community and to serve the poor when called upon by God. Like St. Nicholas, we will gradually attain the "heights of heaven by humility." Today especially (and every Thursday of each week) we ask the prayers and help of St. Nicholas. —Fr Lawrence

• VESPERS HYMN IN HONOR OF ST. NICHOLAS:

O Father Nicholas, thou art the fragrant temple of the all-Holy Spirit, a fountain flowing with the myrrh of gladness, the divine spices of Christ.
