• KONTAKION OF THE RESURRECTION, Tone Seven:

The dominion of death can no longer hold men captive, for Christ descended, shattering and destroying its powers. Hades is bound, while the prophets rejoice and cry: the Savior has come to them that have faith. Enter, ye faithful, into the Resurrection.

• KONTAKION OF THE MARTYR JAMES OF PERSIA, Tone Two:

Persuaded, O James, by thy good spouse, who wast patient of soul, and fearing rather the dread tribunal, thou didst spit upon the Persians' command and the fear of them, and didst show thyself to be an honorable martyr whose body was pruned like a vine.

~ A CHRISTMAS MEDITATION ~

"I behold a strange, most glorious mystery! Heaven—the cave! The cherubic throne—the Virgin! The manger—the place where Christ lay, the uncontainable God, Whom we magnify in song!" (*Ninth Ode of the Canon for the Nativity of the Savior*). Everything is much more than the familiar. It is a mystery that is glorious and strange, blinding and unfamiliar, radiant and new. Nothing is precisely as it seems, but incomparably more profound, infinitely more holy, and indescribably more divine than anything the human mind can grasp. God becomes man. For our sakes, the pre-eternal God is born a young child. All the rules of logic, all the rules of the creation,

all the rules for all things human melt before the fire of divinity that burns, but does not consume, that is majestic, yet humble, and that is our salvation. The Christmas story is not meant to just warm our hearts. It is meant to enflame us with divine love, to cause us to embrace the humility of Christ and become humble ourselves, to embrace the impossibility of the union of heaven and earth and to become earthly angels and heavenly men and women. It should fill us with boldness in an inhospitable world, spontaneity to look and see where the young child is laid, and a readiness to follow the star of Christ's truth wherever it may lead us. All of this is possible if we but humble our hearts and seek to worship Christ, praying that He gives us new eyes to behold, not just the familiar story, but the strange and glorious mystery of God becoming a child, so that we who are in so many ways still children might become gods by grace, coheirs in Christ's heavenly kingdom. It is the conviction of the Orthodox, Catholic, Christian faith that God took flesh to make humans His dwelling; He lived as a creature on earth to recreate the whole of creation; He came and lived and died so that we could live as God intended us to live, both now in this world and in the age to come. For those who are in Christ, everything is new (2 Corinthians 5:17). And yet, here we are — at the end of 2022 — and sometimes it feels like *nothing* is new and instead everything is somehow at best "same old, same old": tired and weary, or getting much worse. What do we make of this? How can we rediscover the newness of Jesus Christ? What would that look like in our lives, our homes, and in our parishes?

This day-long "retreat" will include a series of reflections and conversations intended to stimulate our faith and life in this annual season of renewal. Archpriest Andreas Blom was born and raised in Sweden. He is a graduate of St. Tikhon's Seminary, and the rector of Archangel Gabriel Orthodox Church in Ashland, Oregon, where he has been serving since 2012. Father Gregory Matlak was raised in Utah and is Rector of St. Christina Orthodox Church in Fremont, CA, where he has served since his ordination to the priesthood in 2020. He received his PhD in Theology and Education from Boston College and studied at St. Tikhon's. Archpriest Kirill Sokolov is Dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral and Chancellor of the Diocese of the West. He is a graduate of St. Vladimir's Seminary and earned his doctorate in leadership from Pepperdine University.
