GLORIFICATION OF THE PRIEST-MARTYR ALEXANDER:

The Orthodox Church in America commemorates the Glorification (canonizing) of the New Martyr Alexander Hotovitzky, on December 4th. Read the account of his life and martyrdom **HERE**. He was born in Russia in 1872, graduated from the St. Petersburg Theological Academy in 1895 and went to New York City to serve as a missionary. He was ordained priest in San Francisco in 1896, and served under then Bishop Tikhon (later Patriarch). Through Father Alexander's efforts, Orthodox parishes were established in New York Philadelphia, Yonkers, and Passaic as well as other large and small towns throughout North America. He left America in 1914, and served in Helsinki and then Moscow. After the Bolsheviks took power, he was arrested numerous times and sent to prison camps, and eventually released. In the fall of 1937, the New Martyr Alexander was arrested again —a majority of oral reports testify to his death as a martyr. The Orthodox Church in America, on whose territory Protopresbyter Alexander served as a priest until 1914, venerates him as a passion-bearer, whose life as a confessor ended with sufferings for Christ. The place of his burial is unknown.

MEETING CHRIST:

When our children are young, they come to church and pray with their parents. Great Lent, Pascha, Christmas, house blessings, and so forth are important events and spiritual markers, and draw a person into the rhythm and life of the Church. However, a personal meeting with the Lord Jesus Christ is essential, because without that there's no solid foundation for a living faith in Jesus Christ. A Russian Orthodox priest and his wife describe this for us. They say: "The Church cannot keep a person only through its customs, traditions and way of life, without an inner experience. And in order for him to survive this he should live with the awareness that something must happen, something awaits him. He must experience a 'meeting' and 'fall in love.' Any teenager understands that you need to meet a special person, fall in love and get married. It's no coincidence that God's relationship with Israel and the human soul in general is like a marriage between a bride and a bridegroom. The image of love and marriage for a person's relationship with God is very important and easy to understand. The Lord is like our Church Bridegroom, and our soul is like a bride. We must meet the Lord, fall in love, enter into marriage—a 'marriage covenant'—join the union with Christ, and say that it is for life: 'My soul is Thine.' And be faithful. Of course, temptations will last a lifetime.... As the Samaritan woman was told: Now we believe, not because of thy saying: for we have heard Him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world" (Jn. 4:42). — Borrowed

WINTER HOLY WEEK:
