FORGIVENESS VESPERS:

Vespers begins at 1:15 PM, this Sunday. This Service is our entry into the Great Fast. At the <u>Rite of Forgiveness</u> we approach each other, in an orderly line, quietly and reverently, beginning with the clergy. We bow low, say "forgive me," and "God forgives," then move on to the next person, then the next, and so on.

• THIS WEEK:

On Wednesday evening we will have an opportunity to receive Holy Communion at the *Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts* and be strengthened in our initial Lenten efforts. Those who will receive Holy Communion are asked to prepare themselves by fasting (at least from noon), praying the *Prayers before Communion* and a recent confession.

ANGELS UNAWARES MINISTRY:

Normally we have a meal in the Hall after the Presanctified Liturgy each Wednesday. This week, and this week only, we have been asked by the organizers of *Angels Unawares*, who are in a pinch, if we could provide our Hall on Wednesday evening for their clients to sleep. We won't be providing a meal. Our usual slot for *Angels Unawares*—for which we provide a meal and sleeping space—will be Thursday, March 1. • THE SUNDAY BEFORE LENT—FORGIVENESS SUNDAY:

The last of the preparatory Sundays before the Great Fast has two themes: it commemorates Adam's expulsion from Paradise as well as the theme of forgiveness—God's toward us, and ours toward one another. There are obvious reasons why these two themes should be brought to our attention at this moment: One of the primary images in the *Triodion* [hymn book of Lent] is that of the return to Paradise. Lent is a time when we weep with Adam and Eve before the closed gate of Eden, repenting with them for the sins that have deprived us of our free communion with God. But Lent is also a time when we are preparing to celebrate the saving event of Christ's death and rising, which has reopened Paradise to us once more (Luke 23:43). So sorrow for our exile in sin is tempered by hope of our re-entry into Paradise:

O precious Paradise, unsurpassed in beauty, tabernacle built by God, unending gladness and delight, glory of the righteous, joy of the prophets, and dwelling of the saints, with the sound of thy leaves pray to the Maker of all: May He open unto me the gates which I closed by my transgression, and may He count me worthy to partake of the Tree of Life, and of the joy which was mine when I dwelt in thee before. [Hymn from Vespers].

Note how the *Triodion* speaks here not of "Adam" but of "me," "May He open unto me the gates which I closed." Here, as throughout the *Triodion*, the events of sacred history are not treated as happenings in the distant past or future, but as experiences undergone by me here and now within the dimension of sacred time. The second theme, that of forgiveness, is emphasized in the Gospel reading for this Sunday (Matthew 6:14–21) and in the special <u>Ceremony of Mutual Forgiveness</u> at the end of Vespers on Sunday.... Before we enter the Lenten fast, we are reminded that there can be no true fast, no genuine repentance, no reconciliation with God, unless we are at the same time reconciled with one another. A fast without mutual love is the fast of demons. ...we do not travel the road of Lent as isolated individuals but as members of a family. —From the forward to the *Lenten Triodion*

• NEXT SUNDAY, MARCH 5:

Next Sunday, the first Sunday of Great Lent, is called "The Sunday of Orthodoxy." There is a fascinating and often disturbing history behind that name, with saints and heretics, icon-smashers and icon-venerators, martyrs and persecutors, emperors, empresses, monks and holy nuns. This LINK gives an overview of what is called the *iconoclastic controversy* of the 8th and 9th centuries. The first Sunday of Lent focuses us on the essential nature of icons to preserve the right understanding that God became man. And so we venerate and honor icons of Jesus Christ, the Theotokos and the saints. What is truly essential in all this is that the living icon—the image of God—is the human person. We read in Genesis that God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit said "Let us make man in our image." More on this next week. For now, please remember to bring an icon so you can carry it in the procession after the Liturgy next week. —Fr L

• FASTING:

While circumstances for each person or family may differ to some degree (age, health requirements, etc.) there are some basic Lenten fasting rules that we all ought to follow: abstain from all meat, dairy and eggs until Pascha; abstain from alcoholic beverages during weekdays. Wine and oil are allowed on Saturdays and Sundays. Shellfish may be eaten on any day. Fasting will do no good at all if it is not joined with forgiveness for others and prayer. We also at least try to fast from noise and distractions during Lent. Start by turning off the TV for Lent, or for at least the weekdays of Lent. By Sunday, you will understand why you shut it off. For Clean Week and Holy Week turn off the radios, the games, and the various distractions. If we fast from food and noise and pray for strength, we might, with the grace of God, also be able to fast from sin. A great virtue in fasting is that we may show obedience to God and His will, rather than be led by our own will all the time. —Fr Lawrence
