
#### • PROTECTED TIME FOR THE CHURCH:

Sunday is the Lord's Day, the "day of Resurrection," in which we will gloriously co-reign with Him in His Kingdom and commune in His love and life at the Divine Liturgy. How does one "jump" from the world of daily cares and responsibilities into such a magnificent reality? Orthodoxy likes transitions, as we know, and one can say that the Saturday evening Vespers is the journey we take, spiritually, hearing all about God's plan of salvation: we sing hymns and psalms; we hear about the creation, the Fall from Paradise, the prophecies and the preparation for the coming of the Messiah, His Incarnation, signs, teachings, warnings, His Passion, death and of course, His Resurrection from the dead and the glorious "robe of majesty," the Ascension, the gift of Pentecost, the gift of Holy Baptism, and even the Second Coming, which we await, yet even now taste beforehand in the Church. All this is part of Saturday evening Vespers. All this is well and good, but, somehow external and even unknown for many. We have a conflict in our current way of life, because for very many of us, Saturday afternoon and evening is "protected time" for various activities. After a long work week, a person genuinely has to recharge, and if not that, do housework, chores and errands, or perhaps meet with family and friends. These things are good and necessary activities, but let us also struggle to enter into the holy mystery of the Lord's Day. Simply put, participation at Vespers on Saturday evening can be a wonderful gift to us, and a profound aspect of our preparation for receiving Holy Communion on Sunday. I encourage you to consider all of this. -Fr. Lawrence

**Christian Education for our youth:** Today, in excess of 60% of all Orthodox young people (indeed, of almost all church-attending youth) once they have left their homes, either upon graduating high school or college—leave as well the church, and attend Liturgy only on a most irregular basis... Consequently, Orthodox education, one fully integrated into every phase of life, has never been more urgent...[T]he times call for an education that addresses the entire person, in every facet and function of life, in every faculty of the soul. Where can we find such an education? ...[I]t is near us, and indeed even in the hearts and mouths of our own fellow Orthodox. (Patterns for Life) After many years and approaches to Church school at the parish—working with new curriculum here and there, new groups of teachers, suggestions for classes on days other than Sunday—we are trying a fresh approach this year: A parish mentorship program open to children ages 7-17. We are opening "a door to a different way to think about the education of our children," and are excited to present this program to you very soon.

**Mark your calendars:** The fifteen-day fast before the *Great Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos* (her repose) begins on August 1. We will have a brief service that evening for the Blessing of Water at 6 PM.
