This is also the day before the Nativity Fast begins, so a perfect day for our fellowship to gather. During the lunch we will have a special presentation on art by our own very accomplished art historian Catherine Ostling.

We host Angels Unawares this week, on Thursday, November 2, at 5 PM.

I have learned in whatever state I am, to be content: I know how to be abased, and I know how to abound. Everywhere and in all things I have learned both to be full and to be hungry, both to abound and to suffer need. I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me (Philippians 4:11-13). *Fr Alexander Schmemann* comments:

'Thy will be done.' This means first of all: grant me strength and help me to understand what is your will, help me to overcome the limitations of my own reasoning, of my heart, my own will, in order to discern your paths, even if they are unclear at first. Help me to accept that which is difficult and seemingly unbearable or impossible in your will. Help me, in other words, to desire that which you desire (*Our Father*, pg. 51).

If we are committed to being God's servants, we will seek out God's will rather than our own. We will not constantly be asking for particular things or outcomes (giving God our "honey do list"), as we will trust God to provide what is good and necessary for our salvation. *Evagrios the Solitary* offers this thought:

"Often when I have prayed I have asked for what I thought was good, and persisted in my petition, stupidly importuning the will of God, and not leaving it to Him to arrange things as He knows is best for me. But when I have obtained what I asked for, I have been very sorry that I did not ask for the will of God to be done; because the thing turned out not to be as I had thought."

"What is good, except God? Then let us leave to Him everything that concerns us and all will be well. For he who is good is naturally also a giver of good gifts" (*The Philokalia Vol 1*, p 60). The Psalmist shows us it is OK to offer lamentation to the Lord when we are in difficult circumstances. It is OK for us to express our emotions to

God when we feel despairing or oppressed or experience the sense of absence of God. That is not sin. If we pray the Psalms daily we will often express our complaints, fears and disappointments to the Lord. Our spiritual lives, however, ought also be ever attuned to God's will in any circumstances in which we find ourselves. That union with God is the most important aspect of our lives whether we abound or are abased. —*Fr. T. Bobosh*
