

The November Menaion (hymn book for the month) indicates that the first Sunday of the month is dedicated to the Holy Unmercenary Healers—those saints, most of them martyrs—who were physicians and healers continuing the signs and miracles of the Lord Jesus Christ. See this link for a delightful children's workbook about these healers. Jean Claude Larchet writes: "This concern of Christ's, and then of his apostles, for the sick and infirm was surprising at a time when the dominant philosophies and religions tended rather to be concerned with those in good health, attaching importance to the salvation of the soul alone. Christ, however, expressing God's love for mankind, shows that he has come to save man as a whole, both soul and body, and not only in this life, in which he invites us to experience in both body and soul the first fruits of the

divine blessings, but also after death in the next world where, after raising our body and making it incorruptible, He intends us to enjoy these blessings in all their fullness with our whole being. In other words, with our whole spirit, our whole soul, and our whole body for all eternity."

Feast of St. Andrew—Nov. 29/30: The November calendar is now updated with the addition of Great Vespers for the Holy Apostle Andrew on Wednesday, Nov. 29 at 6 PM and the Divine Liturgy on Thursday, Nov. 30 at 9 AM. That day is also the anniversary of the repose of Konstantin Sakovich, so we will have a Litya for him at the conclusion of the Liturgy.

Journey to Christmas: We begin with the Forty Day Fast on November 15. We abstain from meat, dairy, eggs, and on most days, wine and oil as well. It might be good to add social media to that list. Plan ahead.

Holy Trinity Cathedral in SF has will host the annual Advent Retreat on Saturday, December 2. Please mark your calendars! The retreat master this year is Fr. Andrew Morbey, Dean of St. Mary's Cathedral in Minneapolis, Minnesota (and former Rector of our parish in Santa Rosa). Father's topic is *Why Institutional Church, Anyway?* He will share insights from St. Theoleptos of Philadelphia, a teacher of St. Gregory Palamas, on why we should be in the Church and *in* Church. The Senior Lunch Fellowship ~ Tuesday November 14 at Noon, the day before the Nativity Fast begins: Enjoy a delicious lunch prepared by Matushka Esther Carr, plus a 30-minute visual presentation by Catherine Ostling entitled *Symbols in Christian Art*. This presentation will focus on symbols found in the icons of our own St. Seraphim Cathedral, and will offer comparisons with similar imagery in the traditions of western art.

Some adjustments: On *Mentorship Sundays*, please allow the mentees (children) and mentors to venerate the Cross first. This will allow them to get to the Hall and eat lunch before their mentorship sessions. The youngest

Archpastoral Message of His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon for Steward Sunday, November 5, 2023. To the Clergy, Monastics, and Faithful of the Orthodox Church in America. My Beloved Children in the Lord: Soon we will enter into the season of the Nativity Fast. Once, two millennia ago, the Three Wise Men, Caspar, Balthazar, and Melchior made ready to journey from their eastern homeland to meet the newborn King of



Angels, bearing their treasures with them. Today, as we approach this holy season, it is likewise fitting that we prepare to meet our infant Lord and Savior, the God-man born as a little child, with gifts of our own. What gifts shall we bring? Our fast? But our fast is for our sake, not God's. Our prayer and worship? Yes, above all—but not only. The Child who will be born comes to bring us heavenly blessings, but he nevertheless needs our earthly care. Just as he once relied on his Mother for warmth and nourishment and on Joseph for protection and support, so his Church now relies on our good will in order to maintain its operations in this world. On this Steward Sunday 2023, I ask all of our parishes and institutions to make a special collection on behalf of the Stewards of the Orthodox Church in America. Through

its offices, the Orthodox Church in America works behind the scenes to support your local communities in preaching and living out the Gospel. Whether it is the local and national clergy Synaxes organized by the Office of Pastoral Life, or the free liturgical texts, rubrics, and musical downloads provided by the Department of Liturgical Music, the central Church is doing crucial work to equip the entire Body of Christ for worship, ministry, and witness.
