On this day the Virgin cometh to the cave to give birth to God the Word ineffably, Who was before all the ages. Dance for joy, O earth, on hearing the gladsome tidings; with the Angels and the shepherds now glorify Him Who is willing to be gazed on as a young Child Who before the ages is God.

Glorify Him!* There are so many reasons to thank our Lord and Savior for His kindness in blessing me with the inexpressibly precious gift of serving this holy community. Troparion of Nativity: Thy Nativity, O Christ our God, hath shone to the world the light of wisdom; for by it those who worshipped the stars, were taught by a star to worship Thee the Sun of Righteousness, and to know Thee, the Dayspring from on high. O Lord, glory to Thee.

Kontakion of Nativity: On this day the Virgin beareth the Transcendent in essence; to the Unapproachable, the earth doth offer a small cave; Angels join in choir with shepherds in giving glory; with a star the Magi travel upon their journey; for our sakes is born a young Child, He that existed before the ages as God.

We will not escape the secularization of this feast. We will not change the marketing of goods, the office parties and the exchange of gifts. We will not avoid the need to spend money we may not have, eat too much or party ourselves silly. But with a little work to understand God's revealed truth, we can transcend and baptize the now secular images to bring us deeper meaning. I offer the following examples of what I mean: ...Let every sale in every department store remind us of how God loves us more than the world can understand. The retailers draw us in with sales so that we will come and shop with them. How much more does Christ draw us close? Christ took on flesh to call us home to Him. He suffered at the hands of his own creation, humiliated and murdered. This is the epitome of love. Every retailer, every jingle, every commercial can remind us of God's own love for us. Let every seasonal party remind us of the Joy of Salvation. To save us, Jesus voluntarily came to take on flesh and suffer in his body. His sacrifice and his gift are reasons to celebrate. When we celebrate, we can remember all that God accomplished for us. We can remember His nature of love and mercy. —Fr. John Abdalah

The Holy Spirit guides people to the Orthodox Faith in all kinds of ways. Many of our recent and beloved catechumens have come to the Orthodox Faith and St. Seraphim Church through their reading and study, many via the internet—this is *Passive evangelism*, and we thank God for it. However, if we are interested in more intentionally offering the Good News to others, the simplest, most successful approach to Church growth is personal and simple: Invite people to services (maybe not the *Canon of St. Andrew* during the first week of Lent, but who knows). It's no secret that personal recommendations are the most effective means to encourage people to do anything. Most people want to know that something is worthwhile before giving it a try. Polls show that 47% of Americans are open to being invited to church by a friend. Walking in to the sacred space of an Orthodox Church for the first time can be eye-opening, wonderful, but maybe awkward and intimidating. One is unsure where to go, there being no pews. Newcomers will feel more comfortable walking into a new church if they already know someone who attends. Take a chance—invite a friend. —*Father Lawrence*
