A Hymn of the Feast of the Conception of the Theotokos: The all-glorious great mystery hidden from the beginning of time, which was unknown to angels and men, is manifest today: Mary, the divine maiden, becometh a child in the womb of the chaste Anna, and is prepared as a dwelling-place for the King of all ages, unto the restoration of our race. Her do we entreat with pure conscience, crying out to her: Beseech thy Son and God, in that thou art the intercessor of us Christians, that He save our souls!

Vespers on Saturday evening is the beginning of the celebration of the Lord's Day—Sunday—which is the foretaste of the coming in glory of Christ, the inauguration of the *Day without evening*, and the resurrection of the dead, which we profess each time we say the Creed: "I look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the age to come." Saturday evening Vespers is all about that coming, all about the Incarnation, teachings, Passion, death and Resurrection from the dead. What we do in worship concerns days and times—and Saturday evening Vespers is the prelude and opening to Sunday Liturgy. It would be good if all of us made this sacred time a priority for worship at least a few times a month. —*Fr Lawrence*

There are various tasks that need doing here at the parish. None of these things are time-consuming or difficult, all are simple and practical. We share a common responsible for the Temple, the Hall and the parish grounds—and it's our joy to care for all these things that the Lord has

Please come to make a confession before Christmas. The Holy Mystery of Confession is a gift from God, and as essential to our lives, as is Holy Communion. Confession is not an obligation, but an encounter with the Living God, Who stands before us in that Holy Mystery. Let all of us —priests and people together—make a Confession in these two weeks preceding Nativity in order to be prepared to receive Holy Communion on the feast itself. In general, we aim for anyone over the age of seven to to make a regular confession (for adults, at least once a month is a good benchmark, children less frequently). We operate on the "honor system," which means that I will not ask you if you have confessed for the Great Feast of Christmas. I will be available during the week before Christmas. Please consult the calendar for service times, or arrange an appointment for a confession. See this edifying Encyclical on Confession and Communion from the Holy Synod. —Fr. Lawrence
